~ IN MEMORIAM ~

MORRIS Thomas. Lance Corporal 7th Battalion South Wales Borderers.

Thomas was 29 when he died and his next of kin is given as Mrs. M. Bott (formerly Morris) resident at Tan House, Bucknell. His father is recorded as the late Mr. J Morris.

Thomas was born at Aston-on-Clun. He died on the 10th July 1917 and was buried in the Mikra British Cemetery, Kalamaria, Greece about 5 miles (8 kms) outside Thessalonika. In 1916, when a Greek revolution broke out in Salonika, the Greek national army came into the war on the Allied side. It was at this point the town became the base for the British Salonika Force and contained up to 18 general and stationary hospitals.

"The History of the South Wales Borderers" describes the living conditions for the soldiers in the Salonika campaign. The summer heat was intense and there was no protection for the soldiers. Malaria was a problem and many soldiers succumbed to disease. The daily average of sick was 340 in August and peaked at 500 plus in September. Only the arrival of autumn brought relief for the soldiers. There was no fighting around the time of Thomas's death. His family understand from research they have undertaken that he was drowned while disembarking at Salonika.

JONES Geoffrey Richard. Lance Corporal, 8th Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps.

Geoffrey joined up at the age of 20 on the 21st September 1915 in Swansea where he was living and working at the steel mills. He was sent to France to join the British Expeditionary Force on 25th February 1916. Four months later (1st July) he was wounded by shrapnel and was evacuated to the Western General Hospital, Manchester, where he stayed for two months. He returned to active service and was finally killed just eleven months later.

The 1901 census tells us a little about his family. He was one of two sons (both of whom were killed) of Thomas Jones, a widower who lived at Tan House in Chapel Lawn Road, near to the present Tan House. By the 1911 census his father had died and he had moved to Brampton Bryan to live with his uncle and aunt, Charles and Frances Jones. He was described in this census as being a painter and labourer.

Geoffrey was killed during the Third Battle of Ypres (July – November 1917). The war diary for the 8th Battalion of the KRRC records that the Battalion was involved in heavy fighting on the 23rd and 24th August defending a stretch of land to the east of Ypres, just off the famous Menin Road. The Battalion suffered badly from shell fire during the day as they attempted to hold Inverness Copse from which they eventually had to withdraw. 6 officers and 100 other ranks were killed while 3 officers and 130 other ranks were injured.

One of the more poignant documents in Geoffrey's service record is the official note sent to his aunt Frances in 1920 asking her to sign for and accept his medals and the scroll sent to the next of kin of those who had died in the War. Perhaps it was good that his father, Thomas, widowed when his children were very young, never lived to know that both his sons were killed.

Hello again everyone.

And, as I write, it is Holy Week, the dark foreboding week as Jesus makes His way through all the conflicts to the Cross and then comes out the other side of death on Easter Sunday. Whatever you believe about the timing of Easter to coincide with Spring, it certainly "works"!

We live in troubled, dark times, full of foreboding and news items that whip up fear. But in our small rural communities we do find signs of mutual care and hope, even, or perhaps especially in the midst of our own darkness's. Out of the ashes and brokenness, the darkness of winter, spring the signs of new light and life and hope! Let's determine to grab hold of these and run with them together.

In St. Mary's at the moment, we are facing a fresh start. At the Annual Meeting in April, our two faithful, longstanding Church Wardens, Ian and Jean both stood down and no-one came forward to be elected in their place. We are hugely grateful to them for the service through the years. The wonderfully ordered Church with its eco-friendly heating and the comfortable "facilities", make it an especially welcoming building, not only for those who come to worship regularly, but for the community activities that regularly happen in its embrace. There is a sense that we face a new beginning there. With no wardens currently in post we will be relying on others to help step into the breach to help keep the work and worship and life within the building going. The main role of a warden is to be someone who cares about the Church and the Community; that person should be over 18 and a regular communicant; being a Church Warden does not actually mean the extensive list of jobs that has grown up through the years. Between us, all together we can spread things out and make sure things happen in good order. I would value your prayers for the shape of the future at St. Mary's. And the important thing is that our worshipping life continues happily and faithfully and that there is a welcome for those who come in.

As we move into the summer season, we are hoping to put on some lovely events across our Benefice. On the first weekend of June, the Pilgrimage of Song, which was what first brought me here, will be happening again in our area, exploring some of the lovely Churches on our borders and singing along the way. This year we are using the Prayer of the Gifts by St. Francis along the way. The Sunday Service on 4th June will be at St. Cuthbert's Clungunford, celebrating Pentecost, at 11am. Everyone is welcome to join us and anyone who would like to join with the walking and singing from the Friday to the Sunday, please get in touch with me for details. I know there are several fundraising events coming up, look out for the adverts. We do rely on your support for helping keep the building and the work in the Church going.

During August we will again be holding a series of Summer Sundays across the group with some creative worship and fun activities. Watch this space. A good opportunity for trying us out in a relaxed way.




The atmosphere was very jolly which is to be expected in our friendly and welcoming village and it gave everyone the chance to catch up on news and have a good old chat.



That's commitment

So, THANK YOU Beryl, Florence, Chris and Alan for all you have done for Bedstone and Bucknell over the years.

The new Council, whoever is elected, may well pick up subjects the old PC touched on – e.g. issues raised in the Parish Plan review, published last year. No doubt new members will bring to the PC topics they feel strongly about. That's good: a refreshed agenda is healthy.

But, as I end here, I'm going to inject a little bit of controversy. Some may feel that the PC doesn't actually DO anything: that it's not fit for purpose. The trouble is the PC can't deal with issues it doesn't know about! So please remember that every meeting begins with a time for residents to bring up issues of concern. If there's something bugging you about life in our villages do take it along and have your say. (You don't have to stay for the whole meeting.) Better still, contact one of our new Councillors direct: don't let the issue fester. Now we've got a new Council, let's use it!



9th March 2017 – Outline Planning Application 16/04933/OUT for the proposed development of the greenfield site to the east of Redlake Meadow has been refused outline planning permission.

The Local Planning Authority has determined that the principal housing needs of the village (Bucknell) should be met on a 'previously developed' site (old timber yard) that is allocated for development within the SAMDev Plan together with modest windfall development within the defined settlement development boundary.

The development of a 'greenfield' site beyond the development boundary in advance of an allocated 'brownfield' site would be contrary to the Core Principles of the National Planning Policy Framework.

~ THE BUCKNELL PARISH CHURCH AND THE VICAR ~ FOR HOW MUCH LONGER?

St Mary's Church Bucknell has stood in the centre of the village for more than 900 years. It has had its own vicar for much of that time, although more recently the vicar has had to look after six other parishes as well. Some of us are wondering if church and vicar can continue as they are for much longer. Both cost a considerable amount to maintain.

It is a myth that the Church of England is wealthy. Maybe it had a big income back in the 19th century, but today most of its central income goes to supporting the more general administrative costs. Local churches and vicars have to be funded almost entirely locally.

The annual running cost of St Mary's comes to about £5,000. Lighting and heating bills have to be met; the church insured; and the fabric constantly repaired to make sure the building remains 'fit for purpose'. It's a heavy commitment for a regular, small congregation which is what St. Mary's now has, and upkeep can only be achieved by a variety of fundraising activities, and yet the church needs to be there because the community wants it there. It's a place where many people want to be married, to have their children baptised, and where above all, to have the family funeral or memorial service, followed usually by a burial in the 'new' cemetery. And people can check the time by the hourly bell in the church tower. Many in the village generously helped a year or two back when we had to fund a new heating system, a toilet, and re-ordering the interior so that community events like the Wednesday coffee mornings can take place. But there's still help needed for the regular, ongoing church expenses. The costs of a vicar also have to be met entirely locally. There's no funding from the centre here either. These cover salary, National Insurance, pension, travel and training needs. That is shared out among the seven parishes that make up our Benefice with Bucknell having to find just under £16,000 a year. If you add that to the church building maintenance, it comes to just under £21,000.

What use is a vicar to the general community? It's sometimes forgotten that a Church of England vicar has a responsibility for the whole community – whether people are Christian or not. The vicar is there for <u>everybody</u> – someone to consult with if there's a family or other crisis, who can give friendly advice and who knows where to go for further, more specialised advice. In addition to visiting generally, Vicars spend a lot of time with the families when someone has died, as well as spending time with couples who are preparing to get married in church. They are very much members of the local community and there to be used, and they do this alongside their regular duties of leading worship and training up others to do so. It's a heavy commitment.

So what am I saying? I am <u>not</u> saying that everyone should come to regular services at the church – although a very warm welcome awaits anyone who wants to do so. Nor am I saying that the whole community should dig regularly into their pockets to keep the church and the vicar going, but when there <u>are</u> church fundraising events – exhibitions, concerts, parish lunches etc., the community's support in lending a hand and giving time or money is enormously appreciated. If we have that support, we have a better chance in the future of keeping the church and the vicar available for everyone who needs them.

During April I was knocking on doors right across Clun Division and one issue which came across loudly was people's concerns about keeping our local schools adequately funded so that the future of our children's education is protected.

The changes to the funding formula being brought in by the Westminster Government have had an effect on a large number of schools across Shropshire and here in Clun is no

exception. The Government is cutting £30.86 per pupil from this year's primary school budgets and £22.20 per pupil from secondary schools leading to significant funding shortages that some school governing bodies have to find from somewhere. Unfortunately the last administration in Shirehall knew these cuts were coming from their government in Whitehall but effectively did nothing, refusing to implement opposition plans to ease the pressure on school budgets by using some of the large reserves the administration has built up in its coffers at Shirehall.

These cuts have been labelled as the biggest cuts to school funding since the 1970's against a continuing background of ideology driven government education policy which flies in the face of reality, such as their plans to increase the number of grammar schools, which all the evidence suggests will make social inequality worse by siphoning off into grammars the most affluent children and damaging the future life chances of many more children than it improves, whilst pushing forward with the academy programme, where despite government assurances, we know that the worst academy trusts perform as poorly as the worst performing local authorities and where 6 in 10 academies run deficits in their budgets averaging £350,000. I hope that the new Shropshire Council elected on the 4th May will be able to do something concrete to improve the situation for our schools but we will have to wait to see what the political make up ends up being on the Council but I remain hopeful that, whatever the result, common sense can prevail and parties will co-operate to continue to give the best life chances to our children and grandchildren.
