#### Bucknell Allotment Association by Sally Sparrow

Winter is on the horizon and much to do! Putting a mulch of leaves / straw / grass cuttings on plots will insulate crops, suppress weed growth over winter, improve soil and retain moisture. Garlic, Shallots and Onions have been planted for next year. First attempts at growing them were such a success this year that we took on an extra plot and cannot remember the last time we had to buy these items. We are planting larger quantities as well as elephant garlic (!) for next year to help feed our family with fresh local food. Food prices are soaring and it makes us feel a little smug that we are less reliant on trips to the shops for some of our basics. We feel less like boasting about our carrots, which when dug looked like aliens, huge and twisted and unlike any carrot we'd seen before! They certainly caused a few raised eyebrows and rude jokes but tasted delicious once we had managed to peel them.

We now know our soil is heavy and stony and they will need better prepared beds to grow straighter next year. 'Growing our own' is affordable as other plot holders share tools, seed and harvests of vegetables, flowers and fruit. We are now branching out into 'Brassicas' (a whole new world of organic battles with the cabbage white butterfly, where I intend to call rank!) One new member has joined us and we still have a plot looking for a new 'Allotmenteer' (is that even a word?) If you seek a healthy challenge and want to start preparing for a bumper crop in 2023, let us know. Some members are experienced, many less so and, best of all, there is no judging! 

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
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#### The Rev. Dr. Martin Quayle

#### MY PASSION FOR STEAM



Back in the mid 1970's, Dick Woolley of R.M. Woolley of Bucknell was to sell his pair of ploughing engines to Nanteos Stately Home near Aberystwyth. These engines were driven over the course of three days from the Bucknell area to Aberystwyth. My dad, Norman Wheeler, took me out of school to experience the last day of travel. This event was to spark an interest in steam that's never left me. I remember that day in May 1978 in great detail, I was around 10 years old.



Dick Woollev had worked at Sentinel Works the Shrewsbury from about 1933-1934 where he learned much about Sentinels. He was encyclopaedic on them and much of his knowledge he passed on to my dad. Dick Woolley had owned Sentinel steamers in his time and it became my ambition to find one which I could restore and get back on the road.

This particular waggon, numbered 3976, was the last Sentinel to leave Dick's yard. Dick never ran it after he acquired it from a scrapyard in 1962, but thankfully he did save it from being broken up.

A Mr. John Nudd bought it in 1976 and restored it. He liveried it as Crosswell's Brewery of Ely, Cardiff, as it was when new.

We bought the waggon in 1999 by which time it was now in need of boiler work, so a decision was made to completely dismantle it and carry out a full rebuild.

The rebuild was a privilege to do, many hours of hard work and much learning.

On completion, I wanted to really express my appreciation for a local company who employed many and owned another 37 steam engines apart from Sentinels.

It's been a pleasure to own, to share with others as we take it out. Many memories, and of the people who helped me, and it's good to be able to keep a little of our heritage alive.

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#### Jack and Bill Owen - The Bucknell Blacksmiths



Two old ledgers were loaned to me by Bill Owen's son, Bernard, who thought they should not be thrown away, so they will be kept in the archives of Leintwardine History Society where they are available to view.

John (Jack) Owen was born around 1890, and died in his 40's at the Railway Tavern in Bucknell where he and his wife lived when Bill was born in 1912. Bill was married and living in Bedstone in 1939 according to the pre war register. In 1947, he and his wife Flo, moved to No.3 The Square, behind Smith's shop in Bucknell. He died in 1992 living in his own bungalow just next door to No.3.

Bill (on the left in the picture above) is stood by his father outside the Blacksmith's shop.





The Railway Tavern (shown in the photo left) was owned by Charles Sherwood at the turn of the twentieth century and the family also ran the butcher's shop.

The ledgers contain lists of customers and work done from around 1912 until the late 1930's with Bill joining his father in the business as soon as he was old enough.

Customers with accounts include farmer, Mr Bright, whose account begins in 1915. He lived at Upper House and was an important member of the Clun sheep breeders association.

Mr. Richard Crowe from Weir House was a farmer and boot and shoemaker who started at the Desert. Oscar Evans, a well known local man, was an apprentice leather worker who learned that trade working with Crowes. His account starts in 1914, dealing with any metal work including shoeing horses and ponies, soldering milk pans, removing and adding chain links etc.

One of the Crowe daughters married Geoffrey Sherwood, son of Charles from The Railway Tavern and his account starts in 1912 – he farmed at Lower House and was the father of Martin Sherwood.

During World War 1, Jack Owen had a contract to supply the British Army with horse shoes and they were stamped with the number 3 to identify him as the maker; this would have been a reliable income at that time. Mr Stedman's account starts in 1912. Two brothers, Harry Stedman (New House) and Henry Stedman (Bucknell House) - known by the locals as Black Harry and White Harry, fell out and went through legal proceedings to split everything 50/50, even the house and barn were sectioned off into two parts and can be seen today.

Mr Stanley Harris (Hall Farm) starts his account in March 1913 and Jack Owen is regularly shoeing horses and mending farm implements. Work was done for the Sitwell estate by both Jack and Bill and a substantial bill of £19.15s.4d was paid on Aug 19th 1929 which would have been a welcome settlement for the blacksmiths.

Hurt Sitwell, whose 'seat' was Ferney Hall, Onibury was living at The Cottage, by the church at the time of the 1911 census but in 1922 there was a sale of most of its land and properties.



Mr Channon lived at the Cottage by the mid 1930's and a payment of £1.11s.9d was made in January 1937, which included 11 dozen thatching hooks, suggesting recent work on the roof.

By the 1930's, the country saw farmers suffer as a result of the 'depression' and the account of Mr. Grimes of Lower Lye perhaps indicates this.

The blacksmith accepted 2 pigs to the value of £3 as part payment for a bill of £7.2s.6d in July 1934. By January 1935, the bill was paid off in full. 'Payment' of this kind in lieu of money was common place in rural areas.



The Smith family, who ran the shop on The Square, also had an account with the blacksmiths as they were neighbours. In the 1970's when the third generation Mr. Darry Smith ran the business, he sold it when he retired. The shop continued for a little while longer under new ownership until it was sold again in the 1980's. The site is now covered by two houses.

Both blacksmiths saw to the needs of the vicar, the Woodhouse family and the church. They were always soldering the bath or coal bucket or putting the hinges on the 'wicket'.



On The Square (to the left in the picture) are the blacksmiths with a horse stood outside. It became a blacksmiths in the 1870's when the house to the right was The Plough public house, owned by John Dodd and he and his family were the blacksmiths. The Plough became a house (Harrow House) in the 1930's when one of the Smith's from the shop owned it. It looks like shop assistants are posed outside for this photograph.

An early account revealed that William Ireland Davies started the timber firm which became B&J Davies under his sons Bernard and Jim. Pre WW1 saw oak bark ricks built alongside the railway because the leather industry of the north-west needed the product. As the firm grew so Jack saw much work come his way, but payment seemed a lengthy wait at times. After nearly a year a bill of £20.4s.7d was settled, by cheque.

The Davies family of timber merchants played a big part in the life of the blacksmiths. Jack's eldest son Ernie, went to work for them when he left school leaving Bill to join the family business and after Jack died, in the mid 1930's, Bill went to drive machines that had replaced horse power and therefore replaced the need for much of Jack and Bill's earlier work. However, B&J Davies did build him a 'shop' with a forge in the timber yard, as it was found his welding and metalwork skills were often needed by the firm and by other villagers as well.





Over the last few months many ladies in the village have been busy sewing and knitting poppies to create a Bucknell Poppy display for Remembrance Sunday. There have been some amazing efforts and well over 3000 poppies have been created.

The organiser, Debbie Pope, was astounded at the response when the idea was first mooted so her husband Ron built a supporting frame so that the poppies can be seen to tumble from the church to the ground at the Memorial Stone.





There are also two displays for the lychgate. Many hours were then spent tying the poppies to the frame and on the 18th October a reporter from the Shropshire Star came to the Memorial Hall to photograph the assembly process. A special mention should be given to Julie Parker who knitted 762 poppies.

Not all the poppies were red as some were done in purple wool to remember the animals and birds who also lost their lives helping our soldiers in battle. All three displays were then carefully rolled up and stored until erection of the display which took place on 3rd November (pictured right). Refreshments were served in the church afterwards for all who attended.

#### A Stationmistress Abroad

In August 2022 my family and I went on holiday to Switzerland for one week and did numerous outdoor activities during the stay. We stayed in a mountain hut. One of the activities we did was Via Ferrata.

So, what is Via Ferrata?

Via Ferrata started in the Dolomites (Italy) during the first world war. Soldiers fighting in the mountains fixed metal wires and ladders to cliff faces so they could move around more easily to spy on enemies. Via Ferrata is now a popular sport with some routes still consisting of a mixture of fixed equipment such as metal and wooden bridges, ladders, and fixed ropes, but you may find many other obstacles. Those that take part in this sport should keep themselves safe by wearing a helmet, harness, gloves and most importantly two karabiners on slings to secure themselves to fixed wire throughout the route.



This was the first time I had ever tried Via Ferrata and found it great fun. I had to focus every minute of the activity and think about where I put my feet to stay balanced. My muscles were exhausted by the end of seven-hour adventure. I felt very proud of myself as there are many exposed sections on thin logs and wires 20 metres above the water. It gave me a massive adrenaline rush but I stayed focused and loved the experience. I recommend it to anyone who loves an adventure and a challenge.



#### Changes to Train and Bus Services by Brian Willson



On 11th December 2022, Transport for Wales are increasing our train service from 5 to 6 services each way (Monday to Friday) with better spacing between trains. There is also a useful evening train leaving Shrewsbury at 21.29 (Mon – Fri only) There remains five trains each way on Saturday and two on Sunday.
