The editorship has been a pleasure and I look forward to seeing new editions under the new editorship.



Flood Group - Update

Those whose homes were flooded back in October 2024 should by now have received an invitation to register for PRF (Property Resilience Funding) under an Environment Agency and Shropshire County Council funding scheme.

Running alongside this work, the local Flood Action group, in conjunction with the National Flood Forum to prepare a Flood Responce Plan (FRP). This is a confidential briefing document for the emergency services, so that they are aware of where routes might not be passable and where there are residents who are particularly vulnerable. The similarity in acronyms still causes me to think twice when I'm referring to either project!

Our next multi agency meeting (MAM) happens early in July, where we will be meeting with Highways, the County Council, the Environment Agency and Severn Trent to make sure our Flood Action Plan is being responded to. If you have any particular concerns around flooding, please get in touch with one of the Flood Group members.





The whole event was organised by Sylvia Meredith and with an army of volunteers helping her the hall was decorated with balloons and bunting and tables festooned with flags and laden with sandwiches, savouries and

lots and lots of cake!

We enjoyed music provided by Trevor Wood who recounted his own experience of VE Day in 1945 as an eight year old lad. We also had a moving and humorous account of VE Day from our own



Christopher Price who remembered being spurned by his lady friend for a handsome RAF chap during the celebrations. Christopher celebrates his 100th birthday soon. Children weren't forgotten and they could collect personalised ration books enabling them to receive the amount of sweets children received 80 years ago - 2oz of dolly mixtures! Eileen and Jemima played and sang for us in the interval and then Trevor returned to lead us in the old wartime songs including We'll meet again, Pack up your troubles, The white cliffs of Dover and A nightingale sang in Berkeley Square. Most of us didn't need the song sheets as they were all very familiar tunes. The afternoon ended with rousing 'last night of the proms' songs and we belted out Jerusalem and I vow to thee my country amongst others finishing with God save the King. Huge thanks go to Sylvia and her team for a lovely celebration.



VE Day 8th May 2025

On the sunny evening of Thursday 8th May a small group of villagers gathered for prayers of thanksgiving and remembrance at the war memorial in St Mary's churchyard as part of the celebrations of the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe. This was followed by the ringing of the church bells at 6.30pm in conjunction with church bells being rung throughout the nation. Everyone was encouraged to 'have a go' and it is not as easy as it looks. However the volunteers managed to produce a sound even though it was not very tuneful! It was a good time to remember the villagers who had lost their lives fighting for their country and for those of us who had lost family members and friends in the conflict to remember their sacrifice.

VE Day - Bucknell School

Visit from Mr Christopher Price - on the 80th anniversary of VE Day

We were so fortunate to have a visit from Mr Christopher Price on Thursday 8th May to celebrate the anniversary of VE Day. Mr Price is a neighbour of our school and came in the afternoon with his son.

Today Mr Price is ninety-nine so of course, he was nineteen on VE day. At the time he was training to be a military engineer and stationed in Kent. He explained that he and several friends all decided to go up to London and were there in Trafalgar Square. Mr Price remembered that it was 'packed, with people shaking hands with people they'd never seen before.' He said that there was some singing and sang us a bit of a song called, 'Bless 'em all'.

Our children sat and listened so quietly and respectfully. I know all the staff were very proud of them, and you would have been too. Together, we held the two-minute silence thinking of people who died serving our country, and also thinking of their families. We peppered Mr Price with questions and many children spoke proudly of members of their family who had fought in the second world war.

Mr Price explained that he had travelled on a troop ship from Southampton to Mumbai (then Bombay) in India. He served as an officer in the Indian army and used his engineering skills building bridges in Malaysia.

We were all very thankful to him for coming to school and sharing his experiences with us all. What a wonderful afternoon!

News from the Police ROGUE TRADERS

There have been recent reports of some pushy doorstep traders operating in the Bishop's Castle area, they have been cold calling at properties offering services such as gardening work, tree cutting and gutter cleaning.

- Rogue traders often appear at your door unannounced, claiming to have noticed issues whilst driving by.
- They may try to pressure you into making a decision immediately or sign up for services on the spot.
- They may offer to carry out work cheaply, but charge an extortionate price after it has been completed.
- Do not be forced into making a guick decision on the doorstep.
- Do not allow uninvited callers into your home.
- Beware of 'companies' that only use mobile phone numbers and accommodation addresses.
- Anyone who signs a contract on the doorstep following a visit that was not arranged (unsolicited) have 7 days to cancel it by law.
- All cancellation rights must be provided in writing to the customer at the time the contract is agreed, usually on the doorstep it is an offence not to do so.
- Refuse to be taken to the bank to withdraw money if you ever feel intimidated by them, close the door and call the police.

Social Media and children

Social media use by children is a hot topic at the moment as questions are finally being asked around social media and its impact on young people as well as the wider society. Social media use by children can understandably raise various safety concerns including online bullying, threats, potential grooming along with negative effects on mental health including anxiety. Most social media accounts require users to be at least 13 years old and there is a debate calling for this to be raised to 16. However, it is easy to sign-up to an account with a false date of birth.

My War Years - Betty Bolton

"I was five years old when the war broke out, aged six I became totally deaf through illness and nine years old when it ended. My recollections of these years are quite vivid at times. I lived some forty miles from London and everywhere was in total darkness. No lights could be shown outside - even when using a torch that had been half painted out to dim it. If you showed a light from your home the Air Raid Warden would come knocking on your door - so we had thick curtains to cover the windows.

I was told that you could hear the enemy bombing London and search lights could always be seen scouring the sky looking for enemy planes. Our windows were taped across to prevent the glass breaking from the blast of bombs dropping on London. A few miles up the road from where I lived was a Royal Air Force camp where they repaired damaged aircraft. I remember these planes being transported, going past our house on huge lorries for repair.

Everyone in the area took in RAF men and women, we had two very nice boys billeted with us real Cockneys. They were very jolly and played our piano and sang with my Dad. I lived in a three-bed-roomed house with my Mother and Father, sister, grandmother and these two boys not forgetting our dog, so you can imagine that it was a tight squeeze! Every time the air raid siren sounded we had to go down to the air raid shelter, which we shared with our next door neighbours - complete with all our clutter and of course a gas mask. They were kept in a cardboard box and we had to take them everywhere, horrible, smelly things.

The latter part of the war brought "Doodle Bugs" which the Germans launched over the Channel. They suddenly appeared from nowhere and I was told that they made a horrible, screeching noise which would suddenly stop and they would drop down causing much devastation. I remember seeing one, having been pulled into a shop doorway as it passed over.

My Dad was too old to join up, he had served in the 1918 war, so he joined the Special Constabulary Police force - he patrolled during the night with his friend. Needless to say they never arrested anyone, if anything was going on they turned a blind eye!

I must say that I remember a lot of good times, when everyone pulled together. We were a happy lot. The day the war ended everybody went wild. Houses were decorated with flags and bunting, someone built a bonfire with a Hitler Guy! Food rationing went on for a long time after the war ended, when it did I remember going into Woolworths to buy some sweets -

I was spoilt for choice, I couldn't decide what I would like to buy!"


BUCKNELL NEW VILLAGE HALL

The Open Day went ahead on 12 April as planned. Comments left in the "Suggestions Box" will be considered by the Hall Committee and the Architectural team over the next few months as they seek to develop and finalise the internal layout of the New Hall. Marion Cox has agreed to liaise with user groups (both existing and prospective) to timetable group sessions in advance of the next visit by the team from Liverpool University who plan to meet representatives from the user groups to discuss their requirements in more detail. This ongoing consultation process enhances our chances of building a new Hall that meets the needs of Bucknell residents and improves our chances of securing adequate funding for its construction. The completion of the consultation process moves us to the next and final stage before construction. This stage includes the completion of architectural and engineering technical design, the submission of Building Regulations application, the discharge of precommencement planning conditions etc. Andrew Rolfe has agreed to liaise with the University team on technical matters. As we work through these final stages, attention can be given to the tendering process and, as cost updates become clearer, funding proposals can be considered. Major funders have made it clear that funding applications will only be considered when a project is "shovel ready" even to the extent that contractors have been appointed, subject to finance being made available.

There is much yet to do but progress is being made, which is encouraging.

Coronation Wood - Planting at Lower Lye, an area of 21 hectares is now complete. A total of 31,041 trees planted. This is comprised of 89% (17) broadleaf species, 11% (1) conifer species. Lower Lye is part of Forestry England's four-year woodland creation programme, supported by the Government's Nature for Climate Fund. Nationally, the programme has planted 1.8 million trees across 16 new woodlands in England, covering 1,000 hectares – one of the most significant expansions of England's forests in decades.
